

Sarah Krakoff is the Moses Lasky Professor at the University of Colorado Law School. Professor Krakoff is a nationally recognized expert in Native American law, natural resources law, and environmental justice. She is the recipient of two University-wide awards, the Hazel Barnes Prize for distinguished scholarship and teaching and the Chase Community Service Award for her public service work with low-income communities.

Professor Krakoff served as Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs in 2018-2019 and Associate Dean for Research in 2009-2011. As Interim Executive Director of the Getches-Wilkinson Center for Natural Resources, Energy, and the Environment in 2019-20, Professor Krakoff led a successful fundraising campaign to launch the Water Fellows program, which trains future leaders in water law and policy. She also secured grant funding to launch a new non-profit in the Four Corners region dedicated to supporting communities with the transition to a zero-carbon economy.

Professor Krakoff's publications include *American Indian Law: Cases and Commentary* (with Bob Anderson and Bethany Berger), *Beyond Zero-Sum Environmentalism* (with Melissa Powers and Jonathan Rosenbloom), and *Tribes, Land and Environment* (with Ezra Rosser), as well as articles published in the *Stanford Law Review*, *California Law Review*, *Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review*, and other journals.
